

# Some notes from the Rectory...

A couple of months ago I wrote about how our 'gut feeling' about the depth of meaning in our own experience can lead us to faith in God, but that for some deeper reasons are desired. One such further source area where the presence of God can be seen is by his action as creator. The theistic interpretation of creation is, paradoxically, both the strongest reason for belief in God and the widest source of doubt for agnostics or refusal of belief by atheists. Despite the contrary claims made by science there are still sizable numbers of Christians who read the bible literally when, in Genesis, the creation of the world by God is described in terms of the seven days of the week. This biblical literalism, whilst a comfort to many, also provides an insurmountable hurdle to those without faith who cannot reconcile this telling of creation to the more credible explanations given by scientific deduction. This has led to a perceived conflict between religious belief and scientific knowledge that is not helpful to many of those seeking to understand God in the modern world. The theory that God is proven by the very nature of a designed universe is a 'proof' that develops the scientific knowledge of the 'process' of creation as an explanation of the working out of the creator's plan - by this method of explanation the creation of the world can be seen either as a continuous process that is still in progress or a pattern that was established in eternity and is constantly being worked out. A connected theory argues that the probability that such a complex system as supports life must have an ultimate, guiding force in the form of God.

In addition to the more easily grasped philosophical arguments for the existence of God there are more complex philosophical arguments that revolve around the idea of what 'God' is. In essence these arguments lead to the deduction that by very definition God must exist either because he is the most perfect being or that God is the originating force of all that is. The argument that God exists because God is the most perfect being revolves around the truth of the following statements: (a) God is the most perfect thing and (b) Something that exists is more perfect than something that does not - therefore God must exist. The philosophical argument that God is by definition the source of life aligns in many ways with the historic understanding of the monotheistic faiths but also encompasses the idea within modern physics that there is a formula for all life – read together these, complementary patterns, can be used to argue that science is the exploration of how God (and the world) works in mechanical detail rather than in the broader explanation that is possible by bringing the understanding of faith to bear on situations.

By way of summary there are many ways that belief in God can be explained or justified by the believer – there is no conclusive proof that can be used other than personal experience. It is also possible to see science and religious experience as complementary as long as neither is used in a fundamentalist manner. It is also clear that our own experiences and spiritual development will inform us in different ways and these will lead to variances with others who are seeking the same ends from a different perspective. As we approach and travel through the Christmas season, we are invited to encounter God through love – a perfect love revealed to us in the humanity of Jesus. It is this love – a love that we can follow through from Christmas to Easter – that gives us meaning, and calls us to open our hearts, that they may be transformed by that same love. Let us open our hearts to that gracious gift made known to us – that we might see beyond the immediate and glimpse the possibility that comes through faith in God.

# **Snippets from Stewton**



#### Five ways to 'get the best out of Christmas'

That time is nearly upon us, and it'll creep up quickly. Here are five suggestions for making the best of our celebration of the birth of Jesus.

#### 1. Look forward

It is so easy to see the very important concerns about food, cards, presents and parties overshadow the *most* important. Could you deliberately build in some time each day or each week during Advent to stop, calm yourself, and refocus? A Strange Christmas by Krish Kandiah is a great little book to help us prepare.

#### 2. Look around

No doubt there will be some extra church activities going on over Christmas, but did you know that research has shown that 20% of people in Britain would be grateful for an opportunity to think about who Jesus is? We have so often believed the lie that no-one is interested in our faith. So, seek the seekers, and invite them to something. Who do you know who is likely to be keen to find out more?

#### 3. Look outwards

Deuteronomy 26 contains the instructions for celebrating the Jewish Harvest Festival, but built into the chapter are encouragements to remember the foreigners, widows and orphans in the land in their celebrations. Is there anyone you might include in your festivities, who might otherwise go without?

#### 4. Look again

Part of Christmas is the repetition of readings, prayers and carols that we have been using since 'the year dot'. Could you address the familiarisation by choosing to think more deeply about the words we're using? Ask the Holy Spirit to give you

one new insight into the Christmas story this year, or take maybe just one line from a carol and let it dwell in your thoughts and prayers.

#### 5. Look up

When all the presents are wrapped and the sprouts peeled, take some time to reconnect with the wonder of it all, which can so easily get lost among the mundane. The God of the Universe, the King of Kings and Lord above all Lords stepped down into our world in the shape of a newborn baby so that we might know God and share the eternity of heaven, feasting at his table! Wow! What a tragedy if we miss that!
