

Some notes from the Rectory...

'Thy Kingdom Come'

As I mentioned last month, the annual wave of prayer will take place again this year between Ascension and Pentecost. This will be launched locally with a service of Festal Evensong for the Eve of Ascension Day at 7 30pm on Wednesday 29th May, and ending with Festal Evensong for Pentecost at 6pm on Sunday 9th June.

From Ascension Day to Pentecost (Thursday, 30th May to Sunday, 9th June 2019) local churches and individuals will be using the special prayer resources to pray, as did Jesus' first disciples, for the coming of the Holy Spirit so that people will have an encounter with Jesus Christ. Prayer resources are available free from the TKC website (www.thykingdomcome.global).

Like many other dioceses, we shall be celebrating and praying together in our Cathedral on Saturday, 8th June from 10am until 12.15pm (with an optional Eucharist at 12.30pm). All sorts of creative ways of praying for the renewal of our diocese will be on offer, with a chance to move round and sample different prayer stations, as well as joining in prayer and worship corporately. The morning will also see the official launch of the Community of St Hugh, our own diocesan prayer community of Christians who commit to praying regularly for the mission of the Church in Greater Lincolnshire.

Save the date now, bring as many people as you can from your church, bring the whole family, and experience a variety of fun and fast-moving ways of praying, or enjoy the peace of this building in which prayer has been offered for centuries. Details of other local events will be published in the Parish Notes.

A new Churches Festival for the Wolds and Coast

The first ever Lincolnshire Wolds and Coast Churches Festival is on the horizon, with up to 200 churches preparing to open their doors to visitors over the weekends of 31st August and 1st September and also 7th and 8th September, with churches in our area taking part on the second of the two weekends. The National Churches Trust has just received a National Lottery Heritage Fund grant of £7,700 to deliver this exciting new festival. Made possible by money raised by National Lottery players, the project focuses on revealing the stories hidden within Lincolnshire's churches and the hidden treasures that are waiting to be discovered.

It is going to be a celebration that joins all the Wolds and coastal villages together. A celebration that invites holidaymakers to visit our rural hamlets and rolling hills. A celebration that shares the rich heritage with all, as families are encouraged to become treasure seekers. Using magnifying glasses and binoculars they will be invited to get close up in these mini museums and explore deeper into their history. This is a wonderful community project that is seeing many partners come together to benefit the communities of the Lincolnshire Wolds and the coastal strip. The festival is being delivered through a partnership between National Churches Trust and National Churches Trust Heritage Services Ltd, in conjunction with the National Lottery Heritage Fund, Lincolnshire County Council, East Lindsey District Council, Lincolnshire Coastal BID and of course lots and lots of churches!

The May meeting took place in Church House on Tuesday 21st with nearly twenty members present. Apologies were received from four members. The business was conducted briskly to confirm dates of the next meeting before Pat Wolley spoke about her life-journey in embroidery. She pulled out samples at random from bags, explaining the significance and memories in some detail, for example, the stole she embroidered for her husband's ordination in their fifties: he had been an engineer for many years; or meeting an old school friend at one of the courses Pat went on. Some of the pieces were just breathtakingly beautiful, like the portrait of an18th lady embroidered in cross-stitch and the landscapes which in fact looked like watercolours. Pat leads a contented life of an artist as she spends her free time 'doodling' on canvass with a needle and thread - as she puts it. Some lovely bags made by Pat were donated to the Bring & Buy table which were snatched up by a very appreciative audience.
