

Some notes from the Rectory...

Beginning the Easter celebrations with a wonderful three days

It was not just the weather that broke records at Easter, as churches across the Parish of Louth welcomed people to join in the beginning of the Easter Season.

Celebrations started on Maundy Thursday in the historic parish church of St James', with a service remembering Jesus' command to 'love one another' with the symbolic washing of feet and sharing of bread and wine. This led to the watch at St Michael's church where Jesus' last night was commemorated in the quiet of this special sanctuary of prayer, followed by a commemoration of Jesus' crucifixion on Good Friday. During Good Friday people from churches across the town joined together at Eastgate Union church before distributing hot cross buns around the town centre. The afternoon included a meditative service in St James' focusing on the viewpoints of different people in the story, before the choir of St James' rounded off this most special day with an evening service which included beautiful music inspired by the passion of Christ.

Easter Eve (often known as Holy Saturday), which normally marks a quiet point in the midst of these busy three days, included a new service this year as we welcomed back 'Donk' the donkey (who is a regular attendee of the Christmas Eve Crib Service!) as we retold the story from Palm Sunday onwards – ending at the Easter Garden as we waited to celebrate the joy of Easter Day.

Easter Day itself saw record numbers attending services, which included a Festival Eucharist at St James' in the morning during which the choir sang musical parts of the service from the stunning Coronation Mass by Mozart, ending the day by leading the worship at Festal Evensong, which included the famous Halleluiah Chorus from Handel's 'Messiah'.

Commenting on all of this the Rector of Louth, the Rev'd Nick Brown, said,

'These three days – the holiest in the Christian year – tell the essential story of how joy can triumph over sorrow and life come from darkness. While it is a busy time, the commitment of so many has made this a wonderful celebration of the central truths of the Christian faith. It has been an especial joy to see so many people contributing to the services and events, including those who have prepared the church buildings, those who have decorated the churches with flowers, and all that has gone into making the worship so meaningful – including the work of our choristers and adult singers – without whom our celebrations would be so much poorer.'

Of course, Easter Day only marks the beginning of the Easter Season, which lasts for the 50 days until Pentecost (this year on 9th June), which will be marked by morning services across the Parish and end with Festal Evensong in the Parish Church of St James.

Giving thanks

Many thanks to all those who took part in the Giving Review which was a part of the Lenten discipline of reflecting on out almsgiving at St James. Whilst many of details are anonymous, it is fair to say that there was a positive response as people engaged with one of the practical ways that we can give of what we have to support the work of the church both in Louth and in the wider community.

'Thy Kingdom Come'

The annual wave of prayer will take place again this year between Ascension and Pentecost. This will be launched locally with a service of Festal Evensong for the Eve of Ascension Day at 7 30pm on Wednesday 29th May, and ending with Festal Evensong for Pentecost at 6pm on Sunday 9th June. Details of other local events will be published in the Parish Notes.

Snippets from Stewton

As mentioned last month work is underway on the repairs to the building here at St Andrew's as identified in the Quinquennial Inspection. The bell has been restored and old concrete removed from between the blocks of stone. Maintenance, together with repair is progressing well.

Unfortunately, it has emerged that more work is needed than at first identified in the report, for example holes in the zinc have been caused by water penetrating near the roof stonework. This will eventually lead to rain entering the church if the situation is left to deteriorate. A decision has had to be taken to either let is worsen, or to "bodge" it, or to do a proper repair whilst the scaffolding and craftsmen are on site. It was put to the parishioners who agreed that the work needs to be done now and that there are sufficient funds to do it.

Whilst that is going on, it is largely business as usual. The stonemasons are working with us as safety is important especially when the building is in use for coffee mornings, funerals etc.



Our dad, I quote, "Cllr. Arthur Jaines transported the painting to and from London without charge". The total cost of restoration was £350.

Many of you will know I live very near to St. James's Church and I only have to look up at that inspiring Spire. We were all brought up by our mum, especially, to go to Sunday School and I still have my very first Bible, a Christmas present from my late older sister Dorothy and older brother Len I 1942. Faith is a very important to me.

After the loss of our family members in 1941, I was sent to live with Mr and Mrs John Clark, at Withcall and my journey continued.

I would like to thank all the kind and caring people of our lovely town of Louth who have over the years supported me all my life.
