

### Bell Ringing at St. James' Church

One of the perks of being a warden is that you get invited to see wonderful people doing wonderful things. I would have never climbed the steep 150 or so steps up the tower of St. James' on a Friday evening to hear the bell ringers' practice. However, a couple of weeks ago, that is exactly what I did do, and what a treat it was!

Fourteen people, all keen bell ringers arrived from near and far and got straight to the job of getting the bells ready, and off they went. Suddenly, the chamber was full of the peals of the bells. No, it was not deafening, but pleasantly mellow and a beautiful sound.

I, having settled on a bench in the corner, was mesmerised, watching the elegant movements of the ropes sliding up and down, and felt the tower swaying from side to side gently, like a ship at sea. I was a little alarmed but the ringers were unaffected! Slowly, I too relaxed and began to enjoy the amazing experience of being nearly a hundred feet above the ground, in a church tower-built hundreds of years ago by medieval stonemasons and craftsmen without the use of computers, cranes and the rest of the mod cons. I was, naturally, awe-struck. It reminded me of the vivid descriptions in William Golding's novel, The Spire, which is about the building of a 404-foot high spire loosely based on the Salisbury Cathedral where the stones 'sing', the wood 'shrieks' and pillars 'move', all creating their own orchestra - I had forgotten all this until then. The 'ghosts' of history suddenly came alive at this moment. I enjoyed every minute of it, being both in the present and transported back in history.

The magnificent spire of St. James' Church, built in 1515, visible for miles is both iconic and an apt representation of the town of Louth for it houses the wonderful clock, the bells, the Wild Mare and it is home to the peregrines, which nest here year after year. At 293 feet 1 inch or 89.33 metres (to the top of the cockerel) it is also the highest spire in the country. There have been bells in the tower since the late 15 century. There is a peal of eight bells and they were recast in 1726 by Daniel Hedderly. In 1798 the great bell was apparently cracked when it was rung to celebrate Nelson's victory in the Battle of the Nile. They were rehung in 1957, and the bell are in very good health it appears as the ringers make a jolly good sound to date.

My sincere thanks to JII Day for inviting me, and to her team for making me feel so welcome and letting me have a go at ringing the bells despite having other serious students to teach as well as practice for their forthcoming commitments like the wedding the following weekend at St. James'. 

### THOSE ANGELS AGAIN

If you are inspired to research angels and archangels as an aid to understanding the significance and locations of the various angelic figures in stone or plaster adorning the walls of our church, you will be wholly perplexed by all the contradictory guff provided by the all-knowing Google. After a while you may become aware, unexpectedly, that there is next to nothing about angels in the Bible. They seldom appear and only three are named --Gabriel, Michael, and Uriel. They are not described at all and may indeed have been thought of only as humanoid embodiments of the voice of God rather than as individual beings. You may have recognised those three names as belonging to Archangels, and expect to be given some biblical facts about them, but, regretably, there are none in the Bible itself, and they must have been created by the same process that gives rise to myths. How the legends concerning the names, qualities and powers of archangels and angels arose is a subject best left to those experts called hagiographers, but it is possible to thrash out roughly what our ancestors were told about the angelic hosts - the names and number of archangels and the nature of the anonymous angels. (I will spare myself and you the tedium of thrashing them out though).


It is possible to apply this traditional concept of the angelic hierarchy to, for instance, the two magnificant carved figures on the wall of the Angel Chapel. They are assumed to be Archangels The right-hand one wears a headband of circlet and small cross, while the left-hand one wears a crown and has an extra pair of wings sprouting from the hips. He(?) is evidently senior to the companion-figure and is presumably St Michael, the leader of the Company of Archangels. Unfortunately, the different versions of what that company consisted make various claims as to their number and names: there were from five to twelve of them and more than twelve names. And then, just to introduce a new level of uncertainty about their identity, we take notice that the left-hand figure carries the Crown of Thorns and the other one the Flagellation Post to which Christ was bound for his flogging. These are two of the Instruments of the Passion: those articles that wounded or demeaned Christ at his crucifixion - the dice, the seamless robe, the ladder, the nails, and so on. The difficulty presented now is that the Instruments are usually shown as being carried by ordinary angels, usually accepted to be ten in number, and this is

very important to our research. Behold! in the top of the East Window, in one line of eight and another of two, there are *ten* angels, each one of them carrying an Instrument of the Passion. (To check that, lacking binoculars, you may refer to the photographic record). Good grief! This means that the first pair just discussed may not be archangels at all, merely two of the lower angelic order. If so, counting the three in Mavis Enderby, five other carvings have been lost. If not, and they are archangels, there are only five archangels in some versions of the hierarchy and, if that is accepted, there were never more than five of those wooden images and all of them are accounted for.

I'm not concerned about any of that. The various possibilities present a puzzle that will never be solved. What does matter is that there were originally ten carved angels, each carrying one of the Instruments and they were exactly replaced on the five main beams of the new chancel roof, at the time of Fowler's restoration, by ten pre-Raphaelite gilded angels in two rows of five. Their established symbolic significance was deliberately retained by the depiction of those ten Instrument-bearing angels in the great East Window that was created and installed at that time.

There is even more to it than that. It is very strange that the late and learned Ted Miller was unaware of the well-established theological custom to treat church chancels as the Holy of Holies, and to keep that sacred place separate from the unredeemed world by the roodscreen across the chancel arch. The evidence of this convention is plain to see in the ancient stone figures still on the walls. In the chancel there are now thirty-eight, not very impressive, figures, and they all have wings. In the nave there are nothing but rude and repulsive figures to drive home the difference between Heaven and Earth. The Georgians, love them or loathe them, completely ignored the established significance of the arrangement, and flooded the new roof over the nave with plaster angels and cherubim. They meant well, I suppose. But, Mr Sizer, worry no more. There was never an angel, arch or ordinary, in the nave until 1825.



















### **CRAFT & CHATTER**
