#### News from around the Parish



St James, Louth

We are delighted that services have resumed and the choir are once again leading the singing of hymns.

Outside work is nearly complete on the first stage of stonework repair and there is more work to be done in the spring on the south side and roof.

We are researching ways to improve the efficiency of heating the church whilst achieving the Church of England's aim of becoming carbon neutral by 2030. Not an easy task to balance congregation comfort with climate change objectives.



All Saints South Elkington

The church of All Saints' is a Victorian restoration seating approximately 180 people and along with its church yard, is well maintained. The church organ has recently been restored and South Elkington is fortunate to have an excellent regular organist with others willing to fill in where necessary.

The church institute hosts many village events and is available for hire – contact the church wardens.



St Michael's, Louth

St Michael and All Angels was built due to the generosity of one William Wright, (born in Somerby near Brigg on 24th March 1785). During his childhood Wright attended Louth Grammar School which must have left him with fond memories of the town as in his later years he gave the then current vicar of St James's a blank cheque. This beautiful church was consecrated in 1863 and is a fine example of the work of Louth architect, James Fowler (1828-1892). The original cost was £3266.13s.6d.



St Andrew's, Stewton

After being very cautious, and conducting a rigorous Risk Assessment, we are now able to meet in church again at Stewton St. Andrew's on the 1st and 3rd Sundays of each month at 11am for Holy Communion and we can accommodate 28 people in this small building.

We have opted for the time being not to sing hymns, but our wonderful organist Fred Goodwin plays in the service, with a hymn to meditate on. We realise that, as yet, things are not as they were, but moving cautiously forward we are constantly reviewing the situation.



St Martin's Welton le Wold

St. Martin's Festival Church, Welton le Wold is always open, and has three or four services a year. The idyllic location is perfect for weddings, baptisms and funerals. The acoustics are excellent. Three bells can be rung if required. The main aisle seats 70. The carpeted north aisle is suitable for small meetings, classes and light refreshments, with an adjacent kitchenette. There is an accessible toilet. Our Carol Service is on 12th December 2021.
